Guidelines for Naming a Society Representative to the Mid-America Orchid Congress

The Affiliated Societies Committee of the Mid-America Orchid Congress (MAOC) wishes to strengthen the Society Representative program and the interaction between societies, the Committee and the Mid-America Orchid Congress. It has come to our attention that only 40% of the member societies have named official Mid-America Representatives. We propose the following guidelines for Representatives:

- A. Be a member in good standing of the Society represented and a frequent attendee of Society meetings.
- B. Be willing to serve as a representative on a term basis greater than the term of the Society President to maintain continuity of contact of the MAOC with the Society, but also be willing to be replaced when no longer interested or effective.
- C. Act as the primary liaison between your society and the MAOC assuming duties such as:
 1. Notification of the Mid-America Orchid Congress of your appointment as Representative providing your name, address and phone number [and email address] plus the name of your Society and its regular meeting place and time.
 2. Share materials sent to you through the MAOC rep program with the appropriate Society Officer, i.e., the speakers list with the Program Chair. Know what is available from the MAOC.
 3. Check to see that the Mid-American is distributed expeditiously to your society members and encourage contribution of articles to the Mid-American.
 4. Notify the Society of the dates and places of future semi-annual Mid-American Orchid Congresses and shows and encourage participation.
 5. Personally attend most Mid-America Orchid congresses. (The MAOC has 501-c status making the expenses of official representatives tax deductible in many cases.) Share the happenings and actions of the MAOC with your Society. Take notes of the reports of the Committee chairs for up-to-date news to be passed on to your Society via a column for your Society newsletter or verbally at the next meeting. Be sure that the minutes of the MAOC meetings are made available to your Society and discussed. Be an ambassador, an educator, and an informant keeping your society abreast of all that is happening in the MAOC.
- D. Respond to each request for information or assistance sent through the MAOC Rep channels. Especially important are the surveys sent by the Affiliated Societies Committee to ascertain where changes might be in order.
- E. Arrange for an orderly turnover to a successor, including all materials and the lessons you have learned. Send the name and address of the new MAOC rep to the MAOC Treasurer and Secretary.
